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Why Choose a Connecticut Independent College or University?

Choosing a college is one of the most important decisions a learner can make. The college chosen will influence career choices and form the basis for lifelong learning and friendships. Independent colleges are free of direct state control and can offer the widest possible variety of educational programs and services to students.

- Connecticut residents make up 42% of all enrolled students attending CCIC institutions.
- Enroll 36% of all college students statewide including 52% of four-year minority students
- Award 47% of all degrees granted in Connecticut, including 47% of all Bachelor's, 64% of all Master's, and 58.5% of all Doctoral and 57% of all Professional degrees
- Award 57% of all degrees received by minority students (four-year and above)
- Award 57-82% of four-year and above degrees given in key economic development cluster areas
- On average, 75% of students at independent colleges in Connecticut receive financial aid with an average award per student of \$22,120.



Financial Aid Q & A

“Can I afford the college of my choice?”

Most financial aid is based on the financial "need" of each individual student. Financial "need" is the difference between the cost of education and a student's/family's ability to contribute toward meeting that cost. Because the expected family contribution is based on a national financial aid formula, the amount of that contribution will be similar at each college and university to which you apply. Consequently, the amount of financial aid you may be eligible for will vary from college to college, based primarily on the total cost of education at each institution. Keep in my, however, the college may not meet 100% of your "need." The amount of financial aid you receive is contingent upon the college's awarding practices and the availability of funds.

“What are some sources of financial aid?”

Students receive financial aid from a remarkable array of sources. You may apply for assistance from the federal and state governments, civic or church groups, your employer, your parent's employer or union, professional organizations, and the colleges and universities themselves.

See below to learn about the major state and federal aid programs available to Connecticut students. This information is as up-to-date as possible, but programs are subject to change. You can also check on the latest program information and learn more about financial aid from a college or university financial aid officer or from your high school guidance counselor.

“Who should apply for financial aid?”

Everyone should apply for financial aid. Even if you think you are not eligible for financial aid - **APPLY!** The majority of Connecticut students attending independent colleges and universities receive financial aid. When you are considering the out of pocket cost of attending different institutions, you should include not only tuition, but fees, room and board, transportation, books, and personal expenses-minus any financial aid for which you may be eligible. In order to make these comparisons, you need to apply for financial aid as soon as possible.

“When and how do I apply for financial aid?”

The beginning of your senior year in high school is the best time to start inquiring about financial aid. Your best sources of information are the financial aid officers at the colleges and universities you wish to attend. As you request admissions information from the institutions, also ask for a financial aid application and any related information. Apply even if you think you will not qualify!

All colleges and universities will require you to submit the [Free Application for Federal Student Aid \(FAFSA\)](#) if you plan to apply for financial aid based on "need." This form is usually submitted after January 1 of your senior year of high school.

Some colleges will ask you to submit an additional financial aid application (like the [PROFILE form](#)) that may include a statement of your family's financial resources. Check with the college about required forms and deadlines.

Once you are accepted to colleges, you will find that aid award packages will vary, yet each will

provide information regarding how much federal, institutional and state aid for which you are eligible. Take the time to compare the packages and follow up with the individual financial aid offices if you have any questions. Once you select the right college for you, don't forget to follow through on your financial aid. Be sure to accept your award package and submit any necessary applications or paperwork.

You can receive between \$100 and \$4,000 a year, depending on when you apply, your financial need, the funding at the school you're attending, and the policies of the financial aid office at your school.
<u>Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education (TEACH) Grant Program</u>	Undergraduate or graduate students who intend to teach in a public or private elementary or secondary school that serves students from low-income families.	Up to \$4,000 per year
<u>Federal Work Study Program (FWS)</u>	Program provides part-time jobs for undergraduate and graduate students with financial need, allowing them to earn money to help pay education expenses	Varies, based on wage and hours worked. The amount you earn can't exceed your total FWS award.

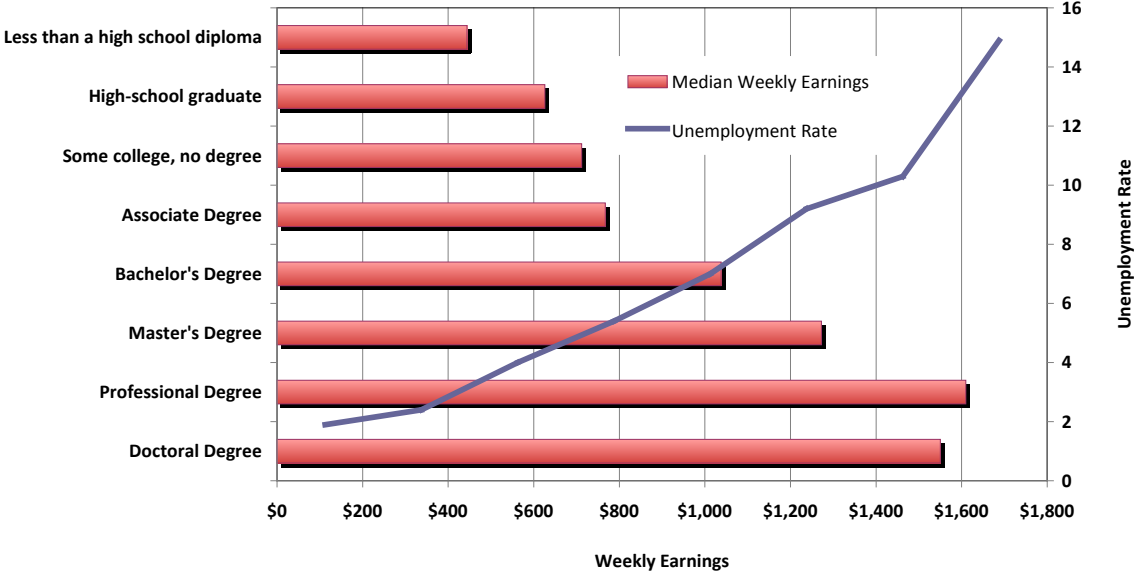

Loans

Program	Eligibility	Amount
Perkins Loan	An undergraduate or graduate student with exceptional financial need.	You can borrow up to \$5,500 for each year of undergraduate study (the total you can borrow as an undergraduate is \$27,500). For graduate studies, you can borrow up to \$8,000 per year (the total you can borrow as a graduate is \$60,000 which includes amounts borrowed as an undergraduate). The amount you receive depends on when you apply, your financial need, and the funding level at the school.
Subsidized Stafford Loan	Students with financial need (interest is deferred until after graduation)	There are limits on the maximum amount you are eligible to receive each academic year (annual loan limit) and in total (aggregate loan limits). The actual amount you can borrow each year depends on your year in school, whether you are a dependent or independent student , and other factors, and may be less than the maximum amounts shown in the loan limit chart (click to see) . Your school will determine what types of loans and how much you may borrow. The interest rate for undergrads is fixed at 3.4%; 6.8% for graduates.
Unsubsidized Stafford Loan	No demonstration of need is required (Interest accrues from the time the loan is first paid out).	See the loan limit chart at the link. The interest rate is currently 6.8% for both graduates and undergraduates.
Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students (PLUS)	Parent or stepparent of dependent, undergraduate student that has a good credit history. Full details on eligibility here .	The annual limit on a PLUS Loan is equal to the student's cost of attendance minus any other financial aid the student receives.

Education Pays: Median Weekly Earnings & Unemployment Rate in 2010 by Educational Attainment

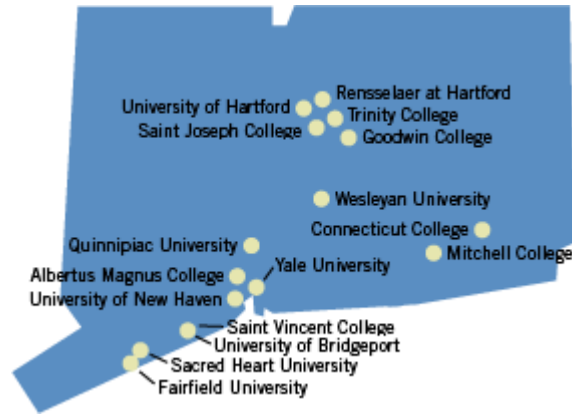
